Expanding your Range

Tips, Tricks and Information Embouchure

There are many factors in flute that go towards creating a great sound, but one of the main elements is the embouchure.

Embouchure refers to the hole in the lips when we play flute - this is what the air comes through and it can affect your pitch, dynamic range and tone.

To get a great embouchure -

Start with your bottom lip covering roughly **½ of the hole**. This is a good guideline for beginning off. This can be adjusted a little for different size and shaped lips. The hole should be facing the ceiling.

Relax, try not to smile. Flute playing is fun, but smiling while playing the flute and pulling the corners of the lips back actually creates tension and will prevent the flexibility needed later on.

To **strengthen** the lips and embouchure, push the middle of your lips forward slightly while engaging the muscles in the middle of the lips. Keep the corners of the mouth relaxed or down instead of up.

Extra tips -

Note bends are great for increasing lip flexibility. You can use your bottom lip to bend the air up and down. This should alter the pitch of the note as well to go up and down. If you are struggling with this, you can use a device like a pneumo pro.

If you want to push this further, have a go at **whistle tones**. Aim a thin airstream up, splitting on the upper edge of the embouchure hole. You should hear a sound like wind whistling through the trees. This takes ultimate control especially if you aim for a long sustained whistle with no change in sound.

Rabbit movement - hold a low note and, in a mirror, try to maintain this while moving the top lip like a rabbit (up and down towards your nose). It is not practical while playing normally but funny and useful in a warm-up.

Keep the back of your **jaw open**, like a yawn or a gobstopper - yes it isn't technically embouchure but it'll make your sound louder and fuller!

The Greats

Even 'The Greats' do not have a picture perfect embouchure - this shows just how unique it is to each person. If your tone is great and you can do what you want on the flute, don't knock it!

My own embouchure is not ideal according to some. My hole is off to one side BUT it has flexibility and I can get the tones I want with it.


