

# Learning Online Guide

Learning Online can be a flexible and rewarding way of teaching with many different platforms now available to do this.

I typically teach online via zoom and am happy to help you get this set up free of charge. If you prefer a different platform, this can also be accommodated. I am also happy to trial this with you if you would like to test this before you commit.

#### Why do I use zoom?

- Zoom has a setting for musicians to help the sound quality. This prevents the instruments from cutting out.
- Sharing files and messages in the on screen chat.
- Screen- sharing capabilities to help with theory concepts.
- Shared file interactions available for on screen games.
- Password Protected and encrypted sessions for student safety.
- I can send you a personalised Log-in link if you chose this option.

### **Getting Started:**

Download the Zoom application from their website.

I recommend using a larger screen or laptop/tablet for lessons so you can see my demonstrations and screenshares easily.

Create a login profile or login if you already have one.


### Zoom - Changing Audio Settings

### **Desktop**

- 1. Sign in to Zoom
- 2. Click your profile picture
- 3. Click Settings
- 4. Click the Audio tab
- 5. Choose your desired audio options (see below for the best setup)
  - a. Zoom background noise removal OFF
  - b. Personalized audio isolation OFF
  - c. Original sound for Musicians ON
  - d. High Fidelity Music Mode ON
  - e. Echo cancellation OFF
  - f.Stereo audio OFF
  - g. Live performance audio OFF
  - h. Automatically adjust microphone volume OFF.
- 6. In the meeting, there will be an 'Original Sound for Musicians' button appear that we can turn on for the best quality sound.

#### Mobile

- 1. Sign in to the Zoom mobile app
- 2. Tap Settings
- 3. Click on the Audio option
- 4. Tap Enable Original Sound
- 5. In the meeting tap more, there will be an 'Enable Original Sound' Button. Click this at the start of the lesson for the best quality sound.



## How to position your camera:

- Make sure the camera is on a steady surface where you can clearly see the screen. The bigger device the better (e.g. laptop/ tablet).
- Make sure I can see your face and your instrument. It is important that I can see your fingers on the instrument.
- For piano position the camera at the side of the piano, looking down the length of it.
- For other instruments place it in front of you with your stand a little off to the side of the camera (so I can see your face and fingers!)

Please make sure you send through photos of your music ahead of your lesson so I can follow along if I do not have a spare book!
